Olympic council picks Malaysia

The Olympic Council of Malaysia has won the bid to host the 127th International Olympic Council session in 2015. The event, to be held in Kuala Lumpur, will be attended by an estimated 1,500 delegates. It is expected to generate an economic impact of US\$5.9 million.

More funding for Indonesia

THE Indonesian Ministry of Tourism and Creative Economy has been granted 25 per cent more to spend on its MICE promotions between now and the next financial year.

The heftier budget will be used to fund "special incen-

tives for PCO/PEOs such as sponsorship of cultural programmes, gala dinners and souvenirs, provided

they bring in a minimum of 300 Indian delegates who will stay for at least three nights", said I Gde Pitana, deputy minister for resources development.

The ministry will also share intelligence such as Indonesian economic indicators, political updates and developments planned for airports, MICE venues and hotels – which may not be immediately available to the public – with Indian bidders looking to bring future conventions to Indonesia.

Familiarisation trips specially designed for Indian MICE buyers will begin in October, and Pitana said this arrangement would likely be a regular feature.

Meanwhile, MICE promotions in India will bring greater focus to more Indonesian destinations such as Batam, Medan, Bintan, Jogjakarta, Bandung, Jakarta, Manado and Lombok, beyond the usual favourites such as Bali.

Russians are coming

RUSSIA and the CIS countries are emerging as hot markets for MICE into India even as the

longhaul sources of the US and UK have slowed or stabilised.

Alpcord Network Travel and Conference Management Company managing director, Chander Mansharamani, said despite no promotional activity in Russia on the MICE

front thus far, numbers had been on the rise.

"The Ministry of Tourism is conducting its regular roadshow in Russia in September and for the first time, there will be a MICE component. We're expecting 18 to 20 Indian participants.

"India is a new destination for the Russians and we're getting small meetings at the moment. These are from the pharmaceutical, power and IT sectors and they are spread out to Mumbai, Delhi and Kolkata," he said.

Mansharamani added that he had seen about five per cent growth from the market this year and this could climb to 10-15 per cent next year.

Travelite (India) directorbusiness development, Amrita Ahluwalia, said the DMC used

to depend on the "wow market" of the US for incentives, but was now focusing on Russia and the CIS countries, as well as the Middle East and South America.

She surmised that the Russian market was growing by 20 per

cent year-on-year.

"I have a feeling that the US will become a thing of the past," said Ahluwalia. "The value of the US market is decreasing; same for the UK. Clients used to commonly ask for palace hotels and villas, but are now exploring even three-star options."

Mansharamani said while he had not seen much of an impact on meetings from the West, budgets had been affected, with clients booking hotels that were one level lower such as a fivestar instead of a five-star deluxe.

Also seeing strong potential in the Russian market is Minar Travels (India), which already handles thousands of leisure travellers from Russia to India annually via charters.

"We're new to MICE and we're trying to get conferences in Goa because we've got special contracted rates with more than 75 hotels there from luxury to two-star," said Amitoj Singh, manager-sales & marketing.

He added that there was potential in the defence and medical industries.

Russian buyer Anna Semushkina, manager of business travel department, Travel4business, similarly noted a spike in demand for both meetings and incentives to India.

She said this was "driven in part by the need for new incentive destinations, as well as Russian businesses seeking to ensure a presence at events or conferences, particularly for the medical or IT sectors".

"Even though meetings are growing, incentives still form the bulk for us. India is attractive to the Russians because of its history and culture. Generally, we send about five to 10 groups each year, consisting of 10 to 50 pax," she said. – Additional reporting by Linda Haden

Busan CVB restructures

FROM November 1, the Greater Busan CVB will come under a new umbrella tourism body that will look at nurturing conventions, incentives and leisure groups for South Korea's secondlargest city.

Speaking to the *Daily*, Greater Busan CVB manager, tourism marketing, June Kim, said the Busan Tourism Organization (its working name for now),

as a "control tower" for all things related to tourism including marketing and development.

"The mayor sees

the MICE industry as a key driver of economic growth for Busan, and with this change, we will see a centralisation of efforts and less wastage of funds," she said, adding that suppliers and trade associations now held their own promotions.

Busan Metropolitan City exhibition and convention division deputy director, Ha Young Ho, pointed out that this would also mean Busan growing its presence at international tradeshows independent of the Korea Tourism Organization, such as its participation here in IT&CM India. While it only has a booth in this inaugural edition of the show, the intentions are for a standalone pavilion next year.

He said: "We see potential in the Indian market because it is so big. Both Busan and India are also strong in IT, so there is an opportunity to tap that area for meetings and incentives."

Sellers toss in value-adds

TO counter the effects of the sliding Indian rupee in a pricesensitive Indian market, some sellers at IT&CM India are tossing in value-adds to stimulate MICE business from India.

Most of these value-adds will help to reduce the cost of pre- and post-show programmes. For instance, The Puteri Pacific Johor Bahru, Malaysia is promoting a US\$100 value-added package that twins Singapore with the southern Malaysian city. The deal, valid till mid-September, includes a night's stay with breakfast at the hotel, entrance tickets to Universal Studios Singapore and two-way transfers.

Indian delegates extending their stay in Hong Kong with their family can take advantage of a Sky100 Hong Kong Observation Deck promotion - valid till next month - which offers free entrance to a child for every two adult tickets purchased. The attraction's managing director, Josephine Lam, said she would be meeting with an Air India representative and Indian outbound specialists at this show to develop special packages.

In Indonesia, Samabe Bali Resort & Villas and Grand Mirage Resort Thalasso Bali are offering Indian clients a staythree-pay-two promotion till October 2013. Ralf Luthe, general manager of Samabe Leisure Hospitality Group, which manages the two hotels, hopes the promotion would attract more incentive groups from India. He noted that with weaker buying power, fewer Indian clients were buying optional programmes such as spa treatments. "Indians are also seeking savings by eating in restaurants outside the hotels," he added.

Indian MICE buyers told the Daily that most Asian sellers have been supportive, sweetening deals with complimentary VIP lounge access, late checkouts, room upgrades and flexible cancellation policies.

Travel Tours Group vicepresident, Joseph K Jose, said Asian DMCs had been willing to renegotiate and offer value-adds such as shopping vouchers.

Abu Dhabi keen on meetings growth from India

ROOMNIGHTS from India are growing rapidly for Abu Dhabi, which is targeting some 2.3 million and 2.5 million hotel guests in 2012 and 2013 respectively.

India ranks as the emirate's second-largest overseas hotel guest source market. In the first six months, some 65,519 Indians staved in Abu Dhabi's hotels

and hotel apartments, a rise of 31 per cent compared to the same period last year.

Abu Dhabi Tourism & Culture Authority international promotions manager, Mubarak Al Nuaimi, said in a release: "Such is the importance of the market that we are investigating the feasibility of establishing a

representative office in India."

Wanting to create further awareness of its meeting facilities, both the Abu Dhabi Tourism & Culture Authority and the Abu Dhabi National Exhibitions Company are exhibiting at this show. The former also participated in SATTE this year.

HKTB works to speed up Indian MICE growth

WITH Indian MICE arrivals on the rise, the Hong Kong Tourism Board (HKTB) is investing in more MICE promotions in India, with a keener eye on the corporate meeting and incentive segments.

A source from the tourism bureau told the Daily that the performance put forth by the Indian MICE market had been "encouraging" and arrivals to-date had registered a single-digit increment.

Initiativies such as specialised training programmes for the travel trade and roadshows with buyer-seller sessions will be ramped up at HKTB offices in New Delhi and Mumbai, with Bengaluru, Chennai and Kolkata as focus markets.

Meanwhile, the Meetings & Exhibitions Hong Kong (MEHK) - the MICE arm of HKTB – is continuing efforts to promote Lantau Island to Indian MICE visitors. Despite the weak Indian rupee, MEHK regarded India as an emerging MICE market with a long-term growth potential, a MEHK spokesperson said.

Building on Lantau Island's varied attractions such as Hong Kong Disneyland and Ngong Ping 360, as well as the destination's diverse 3,200-room inventory that caters to all travel budgets, the MEHK source hopes that the island's appeal will tempt Indian MICE organisers to add an extra day to their itinerary, extending the average length of stay from three nights to four.

Sajan K Gupta, CEO of Vayu Seva Tours & Travel India, lauded MEHK's move to target the Indian MICE segment, as land transportation and room rates at Lantau Island were at least US\$60 cheaper compared to Kowloon. Lantau Island also had sufficient hotels with conference facilities to meet the needs of MICE delegates from India, he added.

Globalindo looks at Hindu events

GLOBALINDO Holidays Indonesia is planning to create a series of religious conferences and events in Indonesia that will target India's large Hindu population.

Speaking to the Daily, the company's business development manager for India and Sri Lanka, Sanjay David, said the events would potentially draw an attendance of 3,000 to 4,000 Hindu followers.

"This is an untapped niche segment that few other MICE organisers are willing to take on. Naturally, due to the size of these events, there are a number of logistical challenges, including the need for a vast number of guestrooms to accommodate delegates, and the provision of food options which meet strict religious dietary requirements," said David.

In addition to large-scale religious events, Globalindo Holidays is also looking at the feasibility of running incentive programmes with a Hindu theme for Indian companies. These programmes will incorporate visits to renowned Hindu landmarks around Indonesia, such as the ancient temples of Borobudur and Prambanan.

Ashwani K Gupta, managing partner of Dove Travels India, said MEHK's promotions were timely as airfares between Delhi and Hong Kong had almost doubled since the beginning of the year, but

added that Lantau Island needed more MICE-friendly tourist attractions.

Rajesh Sethi, managing director, Carnation Travel Services, said: "Incentive groups to Macau have increased substantially in the last four years, and Hong Kong has the potential to attract more of this segment, (but) hotel rates must be kept at a reasonable level for the Indian MICE trade to plan longer (itineraries)."

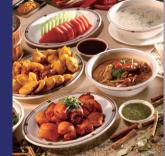

No rest for the ambitious

Hyderabad continues to turn heads in the MICE sector with ongoing hardware enhancement, says **Shekhar Niyogi**

he Andhra Pradesh state earned kudos from MICE players in and beyond India when it launched the country's first regional convention bureau in 2011.

Hyderabad Convention Visitors Bureau (HCVB), which acts as a one-stop-shop for MICE planners, is supported by proper MICE infrastructure and services such as the Hyderabad International Convention Centre, the worldclass Rajiv Gandhi International Airport, hotels and professional event organisers.

Armed with these strengths, Hyderabad, the capital city of Andhra Pradesh, is attracting large-scale trade shows. The city will host the United Nations Convention on Biological Diversity from October 1 to 19, drawing 8,000 to 10,000 delegates from all over the world. In December, Hyderabad will welcome the 5,000-pax World Allergy Organization's International Scientific Conference.

But the state's tourism authority is not resting on its laurels. Chandana Khan, special chief secretary, Tourism of Andhra Pradesh, said: "Hyderabad boasts the best convention facilities in the country but that is not enough. We are creating new products and upgrading historical ones to give delegates an equally satisfying experience outside the

convention venue.

"Heritage walking tours, a sound-and-light show at Golconda Fort, and an annual calendar of events such as the Hyderabad Literary Festival and various dance festivals will enrich (the MICE experience of delegates)."

According to Rajat Kumar, Andhra Pradesh commissioner of tourism, local cultural and arts are highlighted in 12 festivals between August 2012 and March 2013.

Rajani Nair Deb, chief marketing officer of KW Conferences, added that Hyderabad's "historical grandeur, gourmet cuisine and an easy ambience" make the city "an ideal convention location".

Apart from MICE-friendly venues and attractions, event planners keen on Hyderabad are also supported by a good array of hotels. Hotels of international brands that now stand in the city, such as the 287-key Novotel Hyderabad Con-

vention Centre, the 427-key The Westin Hyderabad Mindspace and the 293-key Hyderabad Marriott Hotel & Convention Centre, also offer substantial conference

The city's hotel landscape is still evolving. Fairmont Hotels and Resorts will open a 350-room property in Hyderabad before the year is over. The hotel will have a wide range of meeting and function space, including a ballroom that can seat an event with up to 800 people.

Adding to Hyderabad's future MICE offerings is the Arena Town Centre, which will bring with it a business hotel with 300 rooms and 150 service apartments when it opens in 2013.

Local chain, Ginger Hotels, has also started building a 250room property near the city's international airport.

By 2014, Hyderabad will have 5,315 guestrooms in the four- and five-star category, up from the current count of 3,471 guestrooms.

Jaideep Khanna, general manager sales & distribution, Hyderabad International Convention Centre, said: "After the United Nations Convention on Biological Diversity in October, Hyderabad will be on the global convention map like never before. This one single event will be (the city's) biggest advertisement and exposure to the world."

Raising convention stakes

The IT-savvy destination is eager to flex its muscles in hosting business conferences, says Shekhar Niyogi

ubbed the 'Silicon Valley' of India, Bengaluru has grown beyond its strengths in information, software and aerospace technologies to venture into MICE territory.

Bengaluru's emergence as a hub for conventions and conferences in India is backed by positive indicators – of the 574,005 international tourist arrivals in 2011 and 318,224 arrivals in the first-half of 2012, a majority were MICE and corporate travellers, said trade sources.

K Viswanatha Reddy, director of tourism, Karnataka, said: "Although Bengaluru gets its fair share of leisure tourists (about 20 per cent), 80 per cent are corporate visitors and MICE delegates.

"The Global Investors Meet in June has made Bengaluru the fulcrum of global investment interest, and so MICE can be expected to increase by at least 25 per cent in 2013."

So for in 2012, the city has hosted at least one major conference every fortnight, and its event calendar looks set to be full for the rest of this year. Upcoming events include the International Conference on Advances in Mobile Network Communications and its Applications and the 6th International Conference on Information Processing in August, the Global

Bio-Clinical Trials in September, the Next Generation People Performance Management in October, the Asia Agile in November and the National Conference on Electronics Design, Assembly and Reliability in December.

The city will kick off 2013 with the Global IP Convention in January at the Indian Institute of Science, Bangalore campus. Most of these conferences are expected to host between 1,000 to 5,000 attendees from various

"Although Bengaluru gets its fair share of leisure tourists (about 20 per cent), 80 per cent are corporate visitors and MICE delegates."

Chander Mansharamani, chairman, India Convention Promotion Bureau, said: "Bengaluru is the definitive business city that is constantly evolving to offer next-generation infrastructure for business events. It is on an upward spiral."

The city is already equipped with ample MICE facilities, led by the state-of-the-art Bangalore International Exhibition Centre, which is spread across 15 hectares with over 40,000m² of covered exhibition space.

NIMHANS Convention Centre, located within the National Institute of Mental Health and Neurosciences, has also established itself as a conference venue. Royal Orchid Resort & Convention Centre is a popular venue for mid-sized conferences while other hotels such as ITC Gardenia, The Leela Palace, The Taj West End and ITC Windsor also offer meeting facilities.

ITC Gardenia general manager, Anil Chadha, said: "In spite of added room inventory and banqueting facilities, the corporate travel and conference business demand in this city is constantly growing. We are bullish about increasing our ARR and overall yield through 2012, and expect a healthy jump in 2013."

Sanjoy Pasricha, vice president-sales and marketing of the Leela Palaces, Hotels and Resorts, shares similar views.

He said: "We expect business to grow steadily in Bengaluru without any dramatic movement. This city has reiterated its potential and position as the leading conference and business city in the country, with many fine dining, entertainment and leisure options in the vicinity, as well as great international flight connections."

Bengaluru's hospitality sector is also growing exponentially. The 250-room Ritz-Carlton, Bangalore, 278-room Renaissance Bangalore High Grounds and 250-room Bengaluru Marriott Whitefield will debut later this year, while 297-room JW Marriott Bengaluru, 300-room Marriott Golf & Convention Centre and 397-room Shangri-La Hotel will open next year.

By 2016, Bengaluru's room inventory is expected to increase by 12,500.

A magnet for trade shows

Armed with MICE hardware and experience, Mumbai is drawing large-scale business events, writes **Shekhar Niyogi**

he conference calendar of Mumbai, the commercial capital of India, looks busy. Between now and the end of the year, the city will welcome several prominent trade shows including the India Finance Summit in September; the MetroRail Asia and the 2nd Cloud Computing World Forum India in October; and the Hospital Build and Infrastructure India Exhibition and Congress in

Mumbai's MICE specialists expect the busy streak to continue into 2013, with the 56^{th} All India Congress of Obstetrics & Gynecology taking place in January at the Bandra Kurla Complex in southern Mumbai. The event is expected to draw a record number of more than 10,000 delegates.

MICE infrastructure in Mumbai has provided a good foundation for the destination's trade show growth. Besides event venues such as the Bandra Kurla Complex, the Bombay Convention & Exhibition Centre and the National Centre for the Performing Arts, Mumbai offers PEO/PCOs a selection of quality hotels with event capabilities. Grand Hyatt Mumbai, Renaissance Mumbai Convention Centre Hotel, The Leela Mumbai, JW Marriott Hotel Mumbai and The Oberoi, Mumbai are among

the MICE-friendly hotel options available to planners of residential meetings and events.

Sushil Wadhwa, owner of Platinum Incentives & Events, said: "Most five-star hotels in Mumbai have substantial meeting and banqueting facilities which can satisfy the needs of a large spectrum of MICE clients."

KW Conferences managing director, Monimita Sarkar, said: "Mumbai is doing very well for domestic and international conferences. The connectivity and overall business environ-

ment (in the city) is very conducive for MICE activity.'

However, she feels that the city lacks "a large convention centre (similar to those) in Hyderabad or Gujarat".

Meanwhile, Mumbai's Chhatrapati Shivaji International Airport, one of the busiest airports in India, is slated to unveil its new Terminal 2 by end-2013. The state-of-the-art four-storey terminal will span 439,000m². Facilities include new taxiways, 25 fixed link bridges, 52 passenger boarding bridges, 10 baggage carousels, 104 security check positions, 188 check-in counters, 60 departure immigration counters and 76 arrival immigration

The new terminal alone will be able to handle 40 million passengers a year, fuelling expectations of a leap in passenger traffic into Mumbai once the facility is ready for business.

Mumbai handled 29.07 million passengers in 2011.

Higher arrivals into the western Indian metropolis from 2013 will be supported by a string of new luxury hotels that are slated for opening next year.

Platinum Incentives' Wadhwa, said: "With new luxury hotels such as the Sofitel Mumbai BKC and other international brands that are scheduled to open by 2013, we can expect increased MICE business (into Mumbai)."

Ashis Das, director of The Wanderers, a leisure and corporate travel company, believes that the expansion of airport facilities - which could pull in greater presence of international carriers - and hotel inventory will grow the scale of MICE events in Mumbai.

Other strengths that aid Mumbai's pursuit of business events are the city's extensive fine dining and entertainment options, according to Marie Nadal, owner of Them, You and Me.

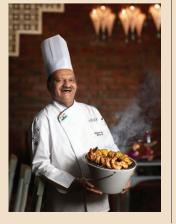

MGTO presses on in India

Challenges are many but the bureau has no intention of cutting its promotions in the market, says **Prudence Lui**



Growth in Indian arrivals to Macau slowed to a crawl in 2011, registering a mere 0.3 per cent increase; Ruins of St Paul's pictured here

he impressive increase in Indian arrivals into Macau seen in 2010 was missing last year. From a 57.3 per cent growth rate in 2010, Indian arrivals rose a mere 0.3 per cent in 2011.

A spokesperson with the Macau Government Tourism Office (MGTO) counted a number of challenges the destination had to overcome in pursuing the Indian MICE market: rising package costs, pricier airfares between India and Macau, a reduction in load factor following Kingfisher Airlines' withdrawal of services to Macau and the

depreciation of the Indian rupee against the greenback.

"These factors have impacted business travel. Corporates have either cancelled, postponed or are looking at cheaper destinations for incentive movements, such as Thailand, Malaysia or Dubai," the spokesperson said.

He added: "Despite all that, we continue to receive requests for support for Indian incentives. We are hopeful that this slowdown will not be here to stay for very long. Macau is able to capture Indian incentive groups. Our representative office in India receives on average two enquiries a day on our Incentive Travel Stimulation Program or for souvenirs for MICE groups."

Two applications from India for the support programme were approved by MGTO in the first quarter of this year. These events involved 505 participants who spent two nights in Macau.

Besides these events, Macau also welcomed six Indian incentive groups with a total of 790 participants earlier this year. They stayed up to three nights in Macau.

While the spokesman noted that there were fewer approved Indian incentive applications in 1Q2012 as compared to 1Q2011,

the number of inbound Indian incentive groups had gone up. Only one group of 167 delegates were noted last year.

With the help of its representative office in India, MGTO will continue to market Macau as a city for business and leisure through familiarisation trips, workshops, seminars, marts and consumer-oriented marketing activities. MGTO will also partner the travel trade to participate in trade shows in India.

Some stakeholders in Macau such as Sands Cotai Central have noted greater popularity among Indian customers.

According to Natasha Tomé, executive director of marketing, Sands Cotai Central, India makes up 10 per cent of the integrated resort's MICE business. The market registered a 6.8 per cent year-on-year growth in the first quarter. Tomé expects growth in the future due to increased air connectivity, flexible meeting packages and increased demand from the delegates "to go somewhere exciting like Macau".

The property has so far

secured a number of corporate bookings for groups with an average of 300 pax. One of the groups will bring over 2,000 delegates to Macau.

Tomé said: "With new direct flights being offered from India to Macau International Airport later this year, there will be greater ease of access."

Peter Hassall, managing director of Off-Site Connections Event Solutions, said: "As Macau grows, Indian MICE clients will find the destination to be more attractive as a result of competitive room rates and a greater diversity of entertainment and venue options."

However, not all MICE players in Macau are as optimistic. Macau Tower Convention and Entertainment Centre's director of business development, Nesta Pun, said Indian MICE traffic had decreased in 1Q2012 owing to the pricey airfare to Hong Kong as compared to flights to other Asian destinations such as Singapore.

The venue has so far welcomed a 300-pax meeting and dinner by Sony in India in June.

India rings in good growth

Indian MICE will continue to grow as long as Singapore steadily innovates and stays competitive, says **Linda Haden**

he potential of the Indian MICE market as outlined by the Singapore Tourism Board (STB) is immense, given that it is one of the fastest growing source markets for Singapore.

Buoyed by improved connectivity to India and greater availability of affordable flights between both countries, further growth is anticipated in the future for both leisure and business travel from India to Singapore.

According to STB, around 20 to 30 per cent of Indian visitors arrive in Singapore each year for business and MICE, a figure envisioned to grow in both value

As part of the wider scheme of things, STB's South Asia area director for marketing, Srithar GB, said the bureau planned to focus on clustering synergistic events to "enable (Indian) business and MICE travellers to maximise their trips for greater returns by providing collective opportunities to conduct business, meet customers or partners and network across related industries".

Examples of clustered events used to draw Indian MICE were three global environmental events held in June and July the World Cities Summit (WCS), Singapore International Water Week (SIWW) and the inaugural CleanEnviro Summit.

WCS, held in July, had featured In-Focus: India, a

platform for government leaders and industry solution providers to share their findings on urban infrastructure and services in India, while SIWW in June hosted the India Business Forum 2012, a partnership event by Singapore's Public Utilities Board (PUB) and the Confederation of Indian Industry.

Srithar added that STB would continue to nurture a vibrant and robust MICE ecosystem to remain attractive to Indian and other MICE visitors "by working with industry partners to co-create and customise quality business events that showcase industry leadership and thought-provoking content, (thus) providing an avenue for sharing insights and best practices".

Simultaneously, the bureau intends to meet the needs of business travellers and event organisers from India "by continuing to devise strategies that feature enriching and personalised experiences", in a similar vein to the campaign targeted specifically at the Indian leisure segment launched in March.

Despite the apparent optimism, Singapore is faced with an overriding challenge when courting Indian MICE.

"With (Indian) business travellers and event organisers becoming more discerning, Singapore needs to maintain its leading position as a business city of choice through constant innovation, while staying relevant and competitive," Srithar said.

Nonetheless, Singapore can leverage on a number of strengths to compete as a leading hub for Indian MICE. He said: "Singapore has reliable infrastructure and global business networks set against a vibrant and pro-business environment."

"It is also home to a host of unconventional meeting venues and experiences, which make for interesting backdrops for teambuilding and learning journeys that can be incorporated into meeting programmes."

Future developments such as the River Safari Singapore to open by year-end, the Singapore Sports Hub by 2014 and The National Art Gallery by 2015, are expected to expand the city's portfolio of venue offerings and enhance its appeal as a MICE destination for Indians.

Earlier in May and June, Singapore welcomed Marina Bay Cruise Centre and Gardens by the Bay respectively.

here was a time when luxurious boutique hotels - usually with a small room inventory and full of character - and design hotels were choice accommodation for leisure travellers who thirst for unique experi-

But the guest profile at boutique and design hotels is fast changing. Corporate clients are increasingly choosing such properties for stays or for hosting exclusive events and incentive programmes, noted Asian event planners.

Business travellers and clients who favour unique hotels may span all ages, but they share some similar traits: they are all well-travelled and desire a distinctive travel experience.

Faye Handley, director of Red Events Singapore, who had used luxury boutique hotels such as Naumi Hotel, Klapsons the Boutique Hotel and Hotel Fort Canning for small- to medium-sized events, said these clients were usually aged 35 years and under, and were "forward-thinking".

'The younger generation is well-travelled. They...wish to stay at hotels that offer a different experience, so they can combine work with pleasure," said Seema Ahmed, general manager, Gainwell Travel & Leisure India.

Corporate travellers are craving for finer experiences, and the proliferation of design-led and boutique properties rich with character is a reflection of the new demand

For Robert Lim, senior vice president of Holiday Tours & Travel Malaysia, corporate clients who gravitated towards small, unique hotels were "top achievers who demand lifestyle experiences".

Unique properties are expected to gain a stronger corporate following as clients mature in their buying behaviour and recognise the need to keep event experiences fresh for participants.

The rapid adoption of these unique hotels by corporate clients has been made possible by hotel chains that have their own boutique and design-led product range. Starwood Hotels and Resorts Worldwide has the fashionable W Hotels and the more affordable spin-off, Aloft. Accor Hotels has the MGallery Collection, which comprises boutique properties with its

own individuality, and designer Pullman, which has a larger room inventory. InterContinental Hotels Group has the Hotel Indigo range of stylish boutique properties that reflect the local neighbourhood and culture. These properties boast stylish function venues fitted with quality audiovisual equipment.

Aonia Singapore MICE director, Darryl Rodrigues, said corporate clients were more inclined to pick design notels that belong to an established chain when organising events abroad, as those "provide some novelty, without compromising on the quality of service clients have come to expect from upscale and luxury properties".

But just as much attention is also being paid to independent boutique and design-driven properties.

It is the recognition that the

accommodation experience is as important as the itinerary of the event," said Rajani Nair Deb, chief marketing officer, KW Conferences India, explaining the growing corporate gravitation towards boutique and design

"The objective of the meeting is the driver in most cases. It may be a celebration of a milestone or a leadership meeting that prompts the decision to hold the meeting in a design hotel. Brand alignment is also instrumental in clients choosing to hold business meetings in these niche hotels. Clients have briefed us that they (represent) a high-end (brand) and hence the setting for the meeting has to be exclusive," said Rajani.

Pacific World Hong Kong MICE account director, Ivy Sung, said a client had once requested for the whole boutique hotel to be booked for a product launch.

violet wang, senior account manager of Pacific World Shanghai, which uses boutique hotels extensively in the Chinese city, found that small-sized incentives were bigger supporters of boutique and design hotels.

She said: "Our clients have always said that they don't want big hotels that overwhelm their guests, especially for incentive programmes. They prefer to stay in smaller hotels, which ensure

good service, style and location.

"The bigger the hotel, the less attention each guest will receive – this is a common client prejudice. Design is also a big factor. More corporate clients are looking for low profile luxury, where the hotel's environment is more subtle and tranquil, instead of one with extravagant trappings and a large inventory."

Wang noted that her clients' incentive events require more boutique-style elements and occupy fewer than 100 rooms. Most of the time, such events were not pure incentives, and would be a client appreciation event or corporate sales kick-off meeting, she said.

An increasing demand was emerging from the luxury fashion industry, automotive and finance industry, she noted, adding that incentive programmes are now mostly for under 100 pax, which fit the boutique model well.

Shanghai CTS MICE Centre general manager, Tom Liu, said corporate clients tended to choose boutique and design hotels to avoid large crowds at five-star conference hotels.

Sushil Wadhwa, chairman and managing director of Platinum World Group India, said the ability to offer novel experiences in a good location was the "trump card" of boutique and design hotels, which cannot compete with dedicated MICE hotels on meeting facilities.

"Many times the historical significance of the property becomes a factor in making a decision," Sushil said, adding that these out-of-the-ordinary hotels are sometimes used when delegates have had their last event at a large chain hotel.

He said: "We did a meeting in Rome in early February for about 40 people, and instead of using a MICE hotel, we chose Grand Hotel Via Veneto (a boutique hotel that occupies 19th century buildings) in the heart of the city. The client was delighted with the hotel's central location, large guestrooms and personalised service."

In Shanghai and Singapore, where there is zealous competition among hotels, event planners said boutique and design hotels were attractive because they were priced more competitively than their five-star branded conterparts.

"As hotel rates for larger or chain hotels in Singapore continue to rocket skywards, some clients, including MNCs, have, upon our recommendation, opted for smaller, boutique properties such as New Majestic Hotel and Naumi Hotel," said Andy Michaels Lim, general manager of Singapore-headquartered Bonvo Travels.

Lim noted that the number of corporate clients choosing to stay in such hotels rose from 100 to 300 between 2010 and 2011.

Unique hotels make their way into vendor lists

Travel buyers are taking notice of unique hotels offered by major hotel chains and some are slowly gaining acceptance as company preferred vendors.

Shauna Whitehead, project manager, CWT Meetings & Events Asia Pacific, said: "Not many sole properties are included in preferred vendor lists. However, with Andaz Shanghai being part of Hyatt Hotels, and Indigo Hotel Shanghai on the Bund being part of InterContinental Hotels Group, both are a definite consideration for companies' preferred vendor lists.'

Whitehead believes that there is now a trend for high-end, boutiqueinspired properties, merged with local influence and all the essentials that frequent business

travellers would expect. Demand for such properties will increase as meetings and events customers expect high-end servicing and amenities, while also appreciating the local influences that hotels such as these have integrated into their design and hospitality.

American Express Business Travel director of advisory services-Japan, Asia-Pacific, Australia, Carl Jones, believes companies generally avoid luxury brands in the current economic environment. and "more locations and awareness of these boutique global chain properties" will allow travellers the chance "to stretch their travel budget from a moderate tier property to upscale".

"(But) I don't see travellers

downgrading from a full luxury brand to an upscale boutique unless mandated or forced," he said.

HRG China general manager, Harald Weber-Liel, said: "We have noted a growing number of enquiries from our clients in China about hosting special events in boutique hotels. These enquiries range from luncheons with clients and incentive meetings for staff.

'We could eventually see a rising popularity among clients from certain industries for hosting events in boutique hotels and resorts. However, demand for corporate stay in boutique hotels in China will probably not change too much (soon) as the economic downturn has seen many companies sticking tightly to their

corporate travel budgets."

surroundings.

While boutique hotels connote a sense of exclusivity for corporate events, which would be a major differentiating factor for clients wishing to deviate from the norm of hosting events in luxury hotels, Weber-Liel said that his company would always consider the objective and size of the event because these hotels were generally smaller.

He foresees a significant number of design-driven hotels emerging in China due to the growing number of high-end consumers. These developments would benefit China's MICE industry as it would grant corporations a larger variety of venues to choose from. - Patricia Wee

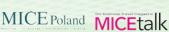

Too pricey, too soon

Sri Lanka's private sector is determined to overcome room rate woes to grow MICE business, says Feizal Samath



The Sri Lankan capital city of Colombo has seen hotel room rates rise from US\$60 in 2010 to US\$180 in mid-2011

ri Lanka is expected to launch a branding campaign in India this October to capture a bigger slice of the Indian MICE market. The joint promotion campaign, undertaken by state-owned Sri Lankan Convention Bureau (SLCB) and flag carrier SriLankan Airlines, was finalised in mid June.

The six-month-long campaign will see MICE roadshows being held in Indian cities such as Pune, Cochin, Chennai, Bengaluru and Hyderabad. There are, however, no information

on whether incentives will be offered to lure Indian MICE buy-

"We had a successful campaign some years back in tierone Indian cities and we saw a surge in numbers," said Vipula Wanigasekera, SLCB general manager, who has observed repeat incentive business from companies in India, such as Microsoft and Sony Ericsson.

However, SLCB's objective may strike obstacles in the form of fast-rising hotel rates in the destination.

"There is huge scope for

MICE traffic from India but our prices are very uncompetitive. We are killing the market," said a veteran industry official who declined to be named.

Sri Lanka welcomed more than 170,000 visitors from India in 2011, of which 25,000 to 30,000 were MICE visitors. Sources said the country's MICE segment had stagnated.

Five-star hotel rates in Colombo, the city that draws the most MICE visitors, have risen in the past two years. Rates have gone from US\$60 per night in 2010 to US\$180 in mid-2011.

There are 15-19 daily flights between Colombo and seven Indian cities including Cochin, Mumbai, Delhi and Bangalore

Hotel prices must also adhere to a minimum compulsory rate imposed by the government - a requirement that has been repeatedly opposed by the local tourism industry.

"We simply cannot attract incentive travellers from India because Malaysia, Singapore and Thailand offer better rates," said Nilmin Nanayakkara, president of the Sri Lanka Association of Inbound Tour Operators, who added that the market should dictate rates, not the authorities. The government thinks otherwise, saying there is potential to increase prices as Sri Lanka is now a peaceful

Despite the challenges, growth opportunities are being shaped by local players who are determined to draw MICE business. "DMCs and hotels have been promoting MICE and we

see growth. We are marketing Sri Lanka as a value-added destination, not a cheap destination, and enquiries are coming in," said a spokesperson for the Taj Group of Hotels in Colombo.

Sri Lanka welcomed two large incentive groups from India this year. One was a 1,000-pax group from Holcim which held a convention at the Bandaranaike Memorial International Conference Hall (BMICH) and stayed in three city hotels. The other was an 800-pax group from Domino's Pizza in India.

Vasantha Leelananda, John Keells Holdings executive vice president and head of destination management sector, believes that Sri Lanka remains attractive to Indian corporate clients. The company handled 2,000 MICE travellers from 10 Indian companies in the first half of the year. Despite the high room rates, Leelananda said 'the market is...growing".

The private sector is also working together to bid for events. It recently bagged hosting rights for a global crocodile conference in Colombo next May, which will be attended by 200 delegates, of which more than 50 will come from India.

Sri Lanka's other obstacle is its lack of convention facilities, according to Imran Hassan, director of Lanka Exhibition and Conference Service, who said that the BMICH and the Sri Lanka Exhibition & Convention Centre were the only large venues in the capital city. BMICH can accommodate 1,500 delegates, while the other offers 3,716m² of exhibition space. The space constrain deepens with BMICH's partial closure due to ongoing renovation. But when it reopens next January, it will be able to seat 1,750 pax and will have improved facilities.

Court lady luck in Colombo

Although Colombo offers various night entertainment in the form of karaoke clubs, glitzy bars and cafes, the city's casinos appear to be the main draw for Indian visitors.

The 10-year-old Star Dust, said to be the longest-established and most popular casino in Colombo, offers daily live entertainment. It is followed by Ballys Colombo which draws the crowd with 60 gaming tables, an elegant bar, a restaurant and a boardroom. The casino sits adjacent to Beira Lake and is within easy reach from several five-star hotels in the city centre.

The Bellagio and MGM casinos are two other well-known attractions. They offer mentary drinks and food who buy a reasonable quantity of chips.

Shop till you drop

There are a number of department stores in Colombo, with House of Fashion and ODEL being the hot favourites of tourists in search of some retail therapy. Both stores stock big fashion brands such as Gucci, Givenchy, Versace, Calvin Klein and Ralph Lauren, and products are said to be cheaper than those sold in India. Furthermore, ODEL stocks its own brands too.

Shoppers can also get their hands on jewellery, cosmetics, homeware, tea, books, sweet treats, bath products, plants and an excellent selection of Sri Lanka-made T-shirts.

Retreat into a sanctuary

The 120-year-old Gangaramaya Buddhist Temple near Co-Iombo's Beira Lake is a must-see for all visitors to Sri Lanka.

Recognised as an important landmark in the city, the temple comprises many statues of Buddha from Myanmar, Thailand and Japan, as well as the Seemamalakaya meditation centre and assembly hall for monks and a gallery with 300 artworks that depict the evolution of Buddhist art over various periods, among other features.

At night, enchanting lights envelop the temple complex.

Make friends with the elephants



The Pinnawela Elephant Orphanage, which lies about 80km north of Colombo, is said to be the first place in the world where elephants were born in captivity.

The 9.7-hectare site was set up by the

government in the late 1970s after it was discovered that the elephant population in the country was close to extinction. The orphanage is home to elephants that had lost their mothers or herds, and there are close to 90 male and female elephants.

The best time to visit is in the morning when the young devour milk from feeding bottles and are then guided by mahouts to the nearby river, where they would play.
